What is ELLIS Master Pronunciation?

Master Pronunciation is a multimedia program designed to help learners to improve their listening comprehension, to correct their pronunciation, and to reduce their accents. The program has five sections: **Pronunciation, Minimal Pairs, Speech Acts, Master Tutor,** and **Tongue Twisters**.

The previous LINC levels described Pronunciation, Minimal Pairs, Speech Acts, and Master Tutor. If you are new to ELLIS Master Pronunciation, we recommend that you read those sections before reading this section, which will explain Tongue Twisters.

Features

TONGUE TWISTERS

Tongue Twisters is a game in which learners can test their pronunciation skills by recording phrases or sentences that are difficult to say, and comparing their attempts with Master Pronunciation.

■ Selection Menus

Clicking on the **Tongue Twisters** button on the Main Menu will access the selection menu. The sentences are sorted by letters, sounds or random selection.



Clicking either Select by letters or Select by sounds

accesses a second menu where the learner must select a letter or sound to study. Clicking **Random Selection** takes the learner directly to the Tongue Twister screen.





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■ Tongue Twister Screen

The Tongue Twister screen then appears with phrases that the learner can record and compare with Master Pronunciation.



Learners listen to a phrase, click **Record** and repeat the phrase, click **Replay** to hear themselves, or **Compare** to hear both Master Pronunciation and themselves.

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How to use Master Pronunciation with LINC Five Learners

Learners need to have mastered the skills described in previous LINC levels. They should be familiar with all the features of Pronunciation, Minimal Pairs, Speech Acts, and Master Tutor. This requires making choices in menus, using the recorder controls and navigating between parts of a section and back to the main menu. Be sure to point out the Help feature, which gives explanations simply and with graphics. Learners can become independent in their learning if they know how to use this valuable reference feature. In Master Tutor, the learner has an additional resource, in that he or she can hear an explanation of sounds in his or her own language, if it is available.

Learners can continue to practise Speech Acts. As mentioned in LINC Two, they deal with speaking in context, and are useful in helping learners to smoothly connect one utterance to another, open or close a conversation, and sequence sentences to ensure a coherent conversation. It is very easy to find a Speech Act that fits in with a theme in the Curriculum Guidelines.

In Speech Acts, suggest that learners start with the top menu option in an assigned topic, and on the Token Response screen work their way from left to right (from Token to Response to Next). Remind learners that before buttons in the Recorder Controls can be activated, they must highlight when the mouse pointer touches them. It sometimes takes a second for the previous command to finish before the next command can be started.

Assign specific sounds or themes, based on learner need and the vocabulary or LINC theme currently being studied. The Master Tutor section will be of help to learners who are having difficulty with specific sounds. The ELLIS Installation and Implementation Guide (which should be available at your site) suggests that the Master Tutor explanations are meant for teacher review, rather than teacher instruction, so we advise that they be recommended to individual learners based on their need.

Tongue Twisters are a fun way to try out pronunciation skills and to wind down a session in the lab. They are not recommended for beginning a session because it might be difficult to restore order after a few phrases like "She sells seashells by the seashore."

For learners to keep track of their work, prepare sheets that list sounds, minimal pair combinations, or Speech Acts themes that you assign for practice. Include sections for the learner to enter an example of the sound or conversation, and a self-assessment regarding whether the activity was easy or needs more practice.
